Fundraising News from the Field:

As the centennial year gains momentum, it is a perfect time to think about how to engage and recognize alumni. Alumni are great allies as they have had the benefit of being in 4-H and understand the value and impact of the program. 4-H alumni should be embraced in all of your centennial plans and that means inviting them to your centennial events and/or reaching out to them to get their 4-H stories. There are several counties that are already doing this and providing a road map for others. For instance, in Mendocino County they are making a concerted, focused effort to include alumni in their annual May extravaganza. The Ukiah Valley Shamrock 4-H Club has contacted the Foundation to get ideas and guidance on alumni outreach strategies and names and addresses of their local alumni. The San Carlos Eaton Hills 4-H Club is doing a history project where they are reaching out to alumni to get their alumni stories. They are particularly interested in alumni who were in 4-H in the 1940s and 1950s and even later. In the Central Sierra, they will be handing out window clings to local business owners that are 4-H Alumni. The window clings say "I got my start in 4-H." This effort will be extended to all four counties, Amador, Calaveras, Tuolumne and El Dorado, in the Central Sierra. These are a few examples of how local clubs and counties are thinking about engaging and recognizing alumni for the centennial and beyond. Foundation News:

Speaking of alumni, the California 4-H Foundation has been involved in a national alumni pilot project. The pilot group, composed of ten states, had its first meeting in December and learned of recent research that identifies our "booster" alumni; these are the alumni who are most likely to be involved through making a donation, volunteering or advocacy. The survey also asked about the impact of 4-H on their lives.

Here are a few of the highlights from the research survey:

- The majority of the respondents were female age 25-54
 - Had small town/rural 4-H experiences
 - Currently live in the suburbs
 - Half of these respondents have children
 - Half of them work full time
 - They are interested in issues surrounding education, human services, health and youth development
 - 96% of the respondents said they had positive experiences as youth in 4-H
- 63% said their 4-H experiences fostered a sense of responsibility and helped them develop character and values

We will continue to bring you updates on the research and the alumni pilot project as we learn more.


